

Animals & Agricultural Production – Law & Policy



A course designed to help students understand the existing legal structure and theory involved in modern animal science. The course allows students to learn and to apply scientific knowledge about animal production for both research and agriculture.



This is a valuable preparation course and learning experience for students interested in agriculture and the ongoing debate about agriculture as a production system. Students will learn how to analyze legal arguments, statutes, regulations, and judicial opinions related to animals and agricultural production. Students will learn how to respond in a professional and accurate fashion to the legal, public policy, and scientific issues involved in the use of animals in agricultural production and contested by the animal rights movement.

Students Eligible:

Students must be enrolled in accredited law schools and have completed their first year of law school. Enrollment is limited to 24 students as follows:

A maximum of 12 students from the University of Nebraska, College of Law.

A maximum of 12 students from the following law schools, enrolled on a first-come, first-served basis:

University of Arkansas, Fayetteville

Penn State, Dickinson

Drake University

University of Oklahoma

Enrollment for the course opens March 26 and closes April 30, 2013. Until April 15, enrollment will be limited to the listed schools. After that, if seats are available, students from other law schools in the U.S. with a maximum of one student per school may enroll by April 30.
